NEWS FROM THE EAST LOOE TOWN TRUST



A BUSY year began with the Grade II Guildhall Clocktower clad in scaffolding, and with restoration of the stonework and clockfaces well under way; now it ends with the Guildhall Rose Garden festooned with Christmas Lights. (The big switch-on is set for 2nd December and we're delighted to be part of the Looe Christmas lights team, extending our display to the seafront, and powering up the East Looe lights from the Guildhall.) The Clocktower now looks great, with the flaking pointing and stonework fixed, and crowned by a refurbished wind vane – though at a considerable hit to the Trust reserves.

In the spring, we were disappointed to learn that we had been unsuccessful in our bid for Lottery Heritage funding to restore the Grade II listed Old Lifeboat Station and Watchtower. We had put together a project that had been strongly supported in town, and are now pursuing alternative funding. We will be going out to seek expressions of interest from anyone with serious ideas about how they could put the restored building to use. A formal invitation through agents is likely, but in the meantime Community News readers have this advance notice – please contact Jane Day (phone: 01503 263709 or email: info@eastlooetowntrust.co.uk).

Summer saw happy times, as we enjoyed the post-Covid freedoms, and our late Queen's Platinum Jubilee. 

WEST LOOF TOWN TRUST





After yet another turbulent year globally and nationally, West Looe Town Trust continues to deliver help and funding to the community of Looe. Due to cost of living and energy price increases this year, which have hit everyone hard, Trustees took the bold decision to reduce rents in all its 11 residential properties to help tenants through the financial crisis.

Charitable Grants to local clubs, organisations and individuals continues to be a mainstay of the Trust's activities, within the scope of its charitable scheme; at the time of writing nearly £25,000 has been granted, with a further £11,000 currently pledged. Additionally, the Trust provides grants of £500 per year to eligible students in further and higher education, with 55 students receiving grants this year, representing a further £27,500 in grant funding. WLTT also owns West Looe Downs, which it manages and maintains as an amenity space for enjoyment and recreation by the people of Looe.

The Trust also operates several car parking areas in West Looe together with a range of commercial properties. Besides providing valuable facilities, the rental income from these sites contributes to funds available for charitable giving. If you are interested in joining the waiting list for parking, or are seeking commercial property to lease, please contact WLTT office.

Looking ahead, 2023 will see the 150th Anniversary of the formation of West Looe Town Trust.

Currently, the Trustees are in the early stages of planning the development of its industrial land and properties at Polean, with the prospect of addition modern industrial units available to support Local Businesses. Exciting times!

MOOR TO SEA PROJECT

'Moor to Sea' is an exciting new project run by Looe Development Trust through a partnership of organisations that have fully funded it to enable heritage and environmental volunteering throughout the Looe Valley.

We live in times where home and the landscape around us have never been so important; nor has the story of industrial history made us reflect more on where we are going. That's why 'Moor to Sea' is important, as it offers the opportunity for fully-funded projects which include researching and recording the oral history of the area. This is a project for everyone to discover and record 'social' history: memories, stories, folklore, how we used to work and play.

We hope to be able to recruit volunteers through the successful team who manage the project to learn to do interviews and store the results. This will create an important long term legacy for the project that can be repeated at intervals and record the story of the Valley as we progress through the years. Volunteering is also a great opportunity to learn new skills and meet new friends. Covid and the cost of living has made things difficult for many, but Moor to Sea does have a small budget to help with meal and travel costs, particularly if you are on a tight income.

We are intending that a project like this will contribute to a travelling exhibition in 2023 which will feature (amongst other things) the role of the railway and canal in shaping he fortunes of Looe, Liskeard and the villages in between. We are looking for exhibits, stories, performances and your own creations to be part of this exhibition so if you have a talent, a skill or something of interest that helps tell the story of the Valley we would love to hear from you!

One of the first things that the project has achieved has been a couple of guided walks from Moorswater to Coombe. The history and beauty of the Valley is hidden behind the Moorswater industrial estate but this link: bit.ly/3A6WBr2, will take you on a journey that discovers the past, including the area's pivotal role in shaping the first industrial revolution, the role of the branch line, sites of interest, businesses and the flora and fauna of the area.

We would love to know what you think about these walks and the information that the site gives you about them. The idea is to add information to these walks, and further trails. It's a stones throw from Moorswater out to Bodmin Moor and Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty; so we want to involve people in designing some new signposting and information points for the area. Leaflets will be coming soon to tell people more; including one which we hope to design with and for children. We are also planning some guided walks and creative events that people can take part in:

LOOE IN BLOOM

It is nearing the end of the season for the Looe in Bloom Volunteers and many of you would have seen us taking down the boxes and baskets.

On behalf of Looe in Bloom Volunteers I would like to thank West Looe Town Trust, Looe Town Council and Looe Harbour Commissioner's for their continued funding and assistance. Also, many thanks must go to local businesses and residents who have also supported us over the past year. The monies raised from the displays they order go towards the planting, weeding, watering and removal. Some 500 window boxes, baskets and displays have been attended to over the year. So, without this help and donations we would not be able to continue to keep Looe looking beautiful for the locals and visitors alike.

Also, our appreciation and thanks go to Tony Brown and his staff at the nursery for the making up all the displays, and to Barbican Motors and other garages for looking after our vehicles and keeping them on the road. Finally, but by no means least, our waterers, who have had such a long, busy, scorching summer keeping all the flowers watered.

Of course, the baskets don't just appear; the boxes, baskets etc. are planted up and are then nurtured by Brown's Nursery until it is time to deliver and then put them up. Delivering 500 pieces from the Nursery to Looe is no mean feat! Then the Pink Ladies deliver the right box/basket to the right premises AND then we have to employ someone (Simon Fisher) to go up and down the ladder, putting them in place. That's when the waterers come into play, starting as soon as the flowers are up, until the end of September; depending on the weather, three or more times a week.

Next the Pink Ladies have to clear the winter plants from the boats and other beds (11 boats, Sea Front, Doctors' Surgery, Brownie bed (by the bridge), Taxi beds (by the telephone box East Looe), Memorial Garden, Mr Holland's Garden (opposite St Nicholas church), various places in West Looe, petrol station and Hannafore (seven beds). Having cleared, we then have to plant for the summer! As you can imagine, it requires quite a lot of planning and good will from the Ladies and the general public, for inconveniences caused by our actions.

Then, in October, we do the reverse, taking everything down, except where people have winter flowers. All the containers are emptied, the remains taken to where they can be re-used (as compost or just replanted). This involves many trips to and from the nursery with empty containers and to collect the winter plants for the boats and other beds, which are then planted.

Add to this, general weeding and tending of beds and you can see we are kept pretty busy.

We also appreciate the help from people behind the scenes who give up their time to assist us.

I hope this has given you an idea of the scale of Looe in Bloom and the work that goes into the final displays that everyone can enjoy.

Once again, we thank you and hope we can count on your continued support in 2023.

Nadelik Lowen! Traditions from the Past From all of us at the Old Guildhall Museum and Gaol



Gin: Cornish mahogany gin is made by mixing two parts gin to one part black treacle, warmed and melted. Traditionally given as a gift from traders to customers from the 'lower classes', the lure of alcoholic treacle would surely entice most people into shops this Christmas.

Montol, Penzance: Culminating on the Winter Solstice (December 21st), Montol is Penzance's annual festival, bringing together some unique midwinter traditions. Practices marking the death and rebirth of the sun were once found all over Cornwall, but today they can mostly be found in Penzance. The streets burst to life with fire performers, musicians, even an appearance from Penglaz, the famous skull-faced 'Obby 'Oss. Then there is Guise dancing, raucous masked celebrations led by the mischievous Lord of Misrule. Another tradition, dating back to the 19th century, is the performance of uproarious 'Mummers' plays' about St George and the Turkish Knight.

Stargazy Pie: For Christmas dinner this year – why not brave this unique festive dish? Fish heads poking out a pie filled with eggs and potatoes. Sounds delicious, doesn't it? This dish is said to be traditionally eaten during the festival of Tom Bawcock's Eve to celebrate his heroic catch during a very stormy winter. According to the modern festival, which is combined with the Mousehole village illuminations, the entire catch was baked into a huge stargazy pie, encompassing seven types of fish and saving the village from starvation.

Cornish Bush: Like other Cornish traditions, the Cornish Bush has its roots in Pagan celebrations for the winter solstice. The three-dimensional wreath represents new life and is made by weaving holly, mistletoe and ivy around a circle of withy. The ring is traditionally hung indoors on December 20th and is topped with an apple. A candle in the middle welcomes in the God of Light.

Carols: Penzance-born Bodmin MP Davies Gilbert gave history one giant Christmas gift: he revived the carol. Carols had fallen out of favour ever since Puritans banned Christmas in the 1640s. But Gilbert took matters into his own hands and urged those with good memories to send him all the carols they could remember for him to preserve. In 1822, he assembled them in 'Some ancient Christmas Carols', including the first publication of The First Nowell.

LOOE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION





Everybody will be looking ahead to the Christmas and New Year festivities but November has a special place in the Legion's year, so please forgive us for looking back at the events leading up Remembrance Sunday 2022.

Poppy Appeal: The Looe Branch launched its 2022/23 Poppy Appeal on Friday 28th October in the Rose Garden of the East Looe Guildhall. For once, the weather was kind to us and we were ably assisted by our members, especially our Chairman, Louis Portman, who was dressed in our branch's unique Poppy Man outfit. We would like to thank our members for giving their time and effort, and the public for their generous donations which raised £882.26 on the first day of our Poppy Appeal.

An interesting anecdote from the event was that the Head of Administration for the Parachute Regimental Association was passing, spotted one of our members sporting his Parachute Regiment beret and had her photograph taken with him and the Poppy Man. Four days later the following photograph and text appeared in the November edition of the Parachute Regimental Association's newsletter: 'Well done to all those members who are involved in the Poppy collections this year for the Royal British Legion. Below is our very own Julia Weymouth who bumped into Paul Allen and their very cleverly disguised Chairman, Louis Portman, in Looe, Cornwall, last week while she was on half term with her family.'



Looe RBL AGM: Our branch held its Annual General meeting on Monday 7th November. There were no changes to our committee members, with David Bryan remaining as President, Louis Portman as Chairman and George Somerville as Vice-Chairman. The Looe branch holds it's normal monthly meetings on the first Monday of the month on the ground floor of the Looe Social Club. Meetings start at 19.30pm and, even if you are not a member, please come along and see what we are about.

Armistice Day 2022: The Looe Royal British Legion Armistice Day Service was held at the Looe War Memorial on Friday 11th November, and marked the 104th anniversary of the end of 1st World War. The short service started at 10.40am, with a two minutes silence at 11am (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month) followed by a bugler playing the Last Post. The weather was quite windy but the service was very well attended by our members and the public.

Looe Festival of Remembrance: On Saturday 12th November, the St Pinnock Brass Band held a community 'Festival of Remembrance' in the Riverside Church. The band has well-established links with the town and were delighted to provide this night of entertainment and reflection on the armistice weekend. The evening featured traditional and new music, soloists and full band arrangements; it was an excellent night of music. There was a period of reflection when our Chairman read the Looe roll of honour, remembering the 75 names on the Looe War Memorial of those that lost their lives whilst serving our country in two world wars and more recently in Afghanistan.

Remembrance Sunday 2022: On Sunday 13th November Looe Town Council joined with the Royal British Legion for the Remembrance Sunday service at the Looe War Memorial. The event began with a procession of Councillors and wreath layers from the Guildhall to the War Memorial. After the wreath laying and prayers, there was a two minute silence at 11am. A wreath was laid for the Monte Cassino Society on behalf of our member Judith Coote who unfortunately couldn't be present. Judith, with two other daughters of Monte Cassino veterans, founded the Society to remember and record the experiences of those from allied nations that took part in the Italian Campaign in World War II. Judith's father, the late Gerald Soady of Looe, served at Monte Cassino. We should also mention Laurence Skentlebery who died at Monte Cassino, aged 23, and is remembered on the Looe War Memorial. It cost the Allies over 55,000 casualties in four battles before the Germans were forced to retire from Monte Cassino which then allowed our forces to advance on to Rome.

Help and Support: The money collected for the Poppy Appeal, and from numerous other fundraising activities throughout the year, goes to providing help and support to serving and ex-Service men and women and their dependants. The funds are administrated centrally and, as well as health and mental issues, there are many other ways that the Legion can help. A recent initiative is the Legion's Cost of Living Grants Programme. It is designed to assist people who need help in a quick and easy way with everyday essentials such as kitchen appliances, clothes, and energy costs. It is open to anyone who is eligible for the Legion's help and is struggling to pay for items and services they need. Applications can be made online at www.lightningreach.org and the aim is to assess applications within five days of submission. Another source of help is the Veterans' Gateway which a first point of contact for veterans and their families to find the help they need. The team of advisors are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week on 0808 802 1212. Connected to a network of Armed Forces organisations, they will make sure that

you are quickly referred to those best placed to provide support, including the Royalty British Legion.

A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR OF LOOE CLLR EDWINDA HANNAFORD





Dear resident

I'm pleased to give you an update on the work of the Town Council and issues within the town. Now that the main tourism season is over, we look to the winter months and what the current numerous challenges are likely to be.

Affordable Housing Crisis

Looking back to early summer as the dire warnings of price hikes to come in the autumn were being aired, many self-catering establishments were reporting slow bookings for May and June. The Queen's Jubilee may have played a part, but people's confidence was waning as they were uncertain what the future would bring. Fuel cost hikes didn't help and neither did the fact that the market is becoming saturated with holiday lets, especially AirBnBs. A recent study showed that in 2016 there were about 1100 AirBnBs advertising on the site across Cornwall; that figure has risen to 11,000 in 2022 and there are other platforms not included in the study. This has led to the crisis in the private rented market that has seen tenants, through no fault of their own, being evicted from their home so the owners could sell or convert to letting to maximise their income.

To try and combat this, tourist associations across Cornwall and Visit Cornwall are championing a compulsory registration scheme to try and weed out those who may be running under the radar. For a small fee they would have to demonstrate they had a trade waste collection certificate and not putting out waste for domestic collection, a Fire Safety Certificate, that if they had a domestic mortgage and didn't live in the property, they were allowed to let as a business, were registered as a food business if B&B (already the law) were paying tax and had the right insurance. The hope is that this regulation might just push some providers back into the private rented market and safeguard guests' safety and allow a level playing field for bona fide businesses.

I am supportive of this approach and have met with South East Cornwall Tourism Association who are also lobbying Government to make primary legislation to allow this to go ahead. We are in the early stages of a delivery plan for more social housing working with Cornwall Council and the Rame Peninsula Trust who have a fantastic record of delivering social housing on the Rame and Cawsand. The advantages of working with this Trust is they have access to funding not available to Councils and the entity of a Community Benefit Society can ensure the homes are not subject to right to buy and can set their own letting policies that can favour locals and key workers in the town. It's not a quick process but we have to do something.

Visitor Information

Looe Town Council continues to offer a face-to-face visitor information service in the Library and Community Hub, guiding visitors and locals to places of interest and public transport information, and issuing leaflets on a range of topics including: shop till you drop, historic pubs, historic East and West Looe, where to stay, dog friendly walks and cottages, walks around the area, places of interest and the SW Coast Path. These leaflets hold such a wealth of information that I've found them useful as a local.

The Council are in the final negotiations to take over the redundant telephone box at the entrance to the harbour car park from Looe Harbour Commissioners to create a pop-up Visitor Information point in East Looe, This will complement the Information Trailer that proved very successful, especially during lockdown outside the library. The Visit Looe website is doing a good job attracting people to choose Looe as their first-choice holiday destination. This investment is subject to a full review next year.

Looe Library and Community Hub

Talking about the library, it moves from strength to strength; footfall and book lending has gone through the roof! We are so blessed to have such a dynamic and committed team of officers. As well as our regular storytelling, Lego club and Knit and Natter, the Hub team have been organising a series of events:

- First Antiques Valuation Event 'Fake or Fortune' in October was a success with a second event planned for January;
- Our first lantern workshop was fully booked and a roaring success, with another one to come at the end of November;
- The Hub is a Secret Santa Drop-off point (more details about this below);
- Looe Community Cupboard November is winter warmers month;
- The Wellbeing Hub taking place fortnightly on Thursdays has been a huge success. It's very well attended; people seem to be leaving very informed and grateful. I think it is successful because the public can speak to different representatives at the same time a real working together vibe. We don't do any of the advising of course but it was our idea to offer these services the space to come together under one 'umbrella' so we can pat ourselves on the back for that part!

Councillors' Surgery

It's important that residents have access to Councillors to ask questions and raise issues. We are relaunching the Councillor Drop-In Sessions – changing it to the first Saturday of the month 10-11am in the Library and Community Hub starting in December.

Accessibility Audit

Looe Town Council are working closely with Access Cornwall, a charity, to undertake an audit of how accessible Looe is for visitors and locals alike and suggest simple interventions to make improvements. These changes are just options to consider. They will also undertake some education and training to help organisations and businesses be more aware of the difficulties people with mobility or hidden disabilities have when access the shops, and the service they require. Finally they are producing an online resource, with a few hard copies, that highlights all the accessible areas of the town so visitors can plan ahead. First reports show that Looe is actually one of the most accessible towns in Cornwall, but improvements can always be made.

Mayor's Charity

I have been planning, with the help of Council Officers, a series of fundraising events to raise funds for a home-grown charity based in Looe, Boundless Trust. The Trust runs a young people's drop-in centre above Simply Fish on the quay, and organises events and experiences for young people. It has recently taken over as the accountable body for a number of social initiatives started by Looe Town Council. These include;

Looe Community Meals, which delivers hot meals for people in need in Looe twice a week.

Looe Community Fund, which helps people with financial problems. We can help towards a utility bill, food parcel or towards a deposit or white goods.

Secret Santa, started by the Town Council in lockdown to spread a little cheer and help make someone's Christmas again this year.

High energy and food bills mean that some households may find celebrating Christmas particularly difficult this year. The Secret Santa scheme provides a gift of a book, toy or game to children up to 11 years of age in Looe and the surrounding areas. Last year over 100 local children received a gift.

We are also providing some mulled wine/cider and mince pies on the night of the lantern procession on 2nd December to raise money for this very worthwhile charity.

Toilet Charging

Looe Town Council owns and manages five sets of toilets in the town, which represents a significant part of our entire precept (budget), currently 25% i.e. £107k. To try and minimise the effects of this cost on local taxpayers we introduced charging on the Millpool toilets only in May. So that locals don't have to pay we also introduced a residents' card for only £5 (cost recovery) available from the Looe Library Community Hub. With the pass you can use the toilets for free. We will review the success in 2023 but first reports show the cost of recouping the investment will be achieved in a little over two years. Income then can be used to offset running costs and maintenance.

Trees at Millpool Car Park

It was very disappointing that neither myself or Looe Town Council were informed about the lopping of Cherry trees on the car park. We have been reassured that they were at the end of their useful life and causing damage to the path and an apology was issued on the poor communication.

Moving forward, Cllrs Smith and Barker met with myself and Cornwall Council Officers to discuss the felling of the trees on the Millpool and to plan locations for replacement trees. In attendance was Sarah Sims the Liskeard/Looe Community Link Officer, the tree officer for SE Cornwall, Forestry team (risk management), the Highways coordinator on environmental issues and services coordinator. The pathway is also due to be reinstated as it is quite distorted and a possible trip hazard. It's now with the Highways design team to come up with a scheme and delivery plan.

Several trees are initially planned to replace the felled cherries in different locations to allow for the path to be reinstated this planting season. Trees include a field

maple, oaks, ginkgo, Spanish Oak, Cockspur Hawthorn, Rockhamptom Red and Sweet Gum. This is a phased replanting of the whole of the car park to replace lost or declining/dead trees. Ground investigations need to be undertaken to ensure the roots have room and the soil is suitable. We want to get the ground conditions right so the replacement trees can thrive. The planting season runs up to March so we have a little time to get this right. We are meeting again in two weeks so Looe Town Council's feedback can be incorporated into the planting scheme.

Seasons Greetings

As always, there is a lot going on right now and there will be particular challenges for some in our community over the festive period with rising costs of living, etc. I hope that Looe residents will continue to come together and support each other throughout the coming months so that everyone can enjoy the Christmas season.

This year's significant investment at Tregoad Holiday Park by owner Waterside Holiday Group, forming part of a multi-million-pound phased redevelopment plan, has resulted in the park celebrating various milestones, including being awarded a five-star quality rating by Visit England.

Matt Way, General Manager at Tregoad Holiday Park, commented: "Our team has worked exceptionally hard to get the Park to where it is today, focusing on delivering a five-star holiday experience to guests while also honouring our commitment to improving sustainability throughout all operations. We are going through a programme of development, which means emissions, and as we welcome more customers there is the likelihood of our carbon footprint growing. Our concern is about the impact of this. "Climate Vision has helped make net zero accessible, rather than being a massive hill to climb. Since being introduced to the family-run Higher Kestle Farm, located near Mevagissey on Cornwall's south coast, we have enlisted their help in an innovative plan to offset our site's carbon footprint. We agreed to part-fund this great project to plant and measure the impact of herbal ley on holding water and reducing flooding. For us, this is a learning curve and just the beginning."



Tregoad Holiday Park creates 170 tonnes of carbon emissions a year, but is trying to tackle the issue by putting £2,500 towards sowing two fields – around five acres – of herbal ley at Higher Kestle Farm in St Ewe. Social enterprise Climate Vision in Truro devised the project, which forms part of the park's net zero planning pathway. The Tregoad team have been working

closely with local farm manager Richard Lobb where they are trialling the innovative solution. In collaboration it would help Cornwall achieve its target, as Legislation requires busi¬nesses across the county to cut emissions by 78% by 2035.

Article 4(2) Direction for Looe

If you are proposing to carry out alterations to a residential property in Looe's Conservation Area this will affect you.

Looe was designated a Conservation Area in 1973 because of its history and special character. The town©s heritage is an irreplaceable resource which is in everyone©s interest to preserve and enhance.

By improving our surroundings, we can enjoy a better living environment and economic benefits.

An **Article 4 Direction** applies within the shaded zone of the map overleaf and states that a planning application will be required for the following types of building alterations which might otherwise qualify as permitted development:

 the erection, alteration or removal of a chimney on a house, or on a building within the curtilage of a house

and any of the following developments which would front a highway, waterway or open space:

- the enlargement, improvement or other alteration of a house, including alteration to or replacement of windows and doors
- · the alteration of a house roof, including re-roofing
- the erection or construction of a porch outside any external door of a house
- the erection or demolition of a gate, fence, wall or other means of enclosure within the curtilage of a house
- · the painting or rendering of walls and other minor works.

The requirement to seek planning permission in the above cases gives local authority officers an opportunity to provide guidance to property owners on forms of development that are appropriate for the Conservation Area.


Planning applications for alterations that would not preserve or enhance the character or appearance of the Conservation Area such as; replacing traditional window frames with aluminium or uPVC, altering the proportion of traditional windows to a modern layout or replacing traditional wooden doors with synthetic replica doors will normally be recommended for refusal.

The Council will not normally approve the loss or replacement of important or traditional features with modern ones and is unlikely to allow the use of inappropriate substitute materials such as aluminium or plastic. Where modern materials have replaced traditional ones in the past, it is expected that the correct original materials and details will be restored when circumstances allow or when further replacement is needed.

If you are proposing to carry out alterations or other building works in the Conservation Area, we advise you to always consult Cornwall Council©s planning team (telephone 0300 1234 151).

Please note that there is no longer an exemption from fees for planning applications required only by virtue of an Article 4 Direction. See overleaf for map of Article 4 Direction boundary and information regarding Listed Buildings...

Additional requirement if a Listed Building:

Looe has many nationally important buildings that are listed for their special architectural and historic interest. Irrespective of the Article 4 Direction, Listed Building Consent is required for all works of demolition of a listed building, or for its alteration (both inside or out) or extension, which is likely to affect its character as a building of special architectural or historical interest.

LOOE FLOOD DEFENCE AND REGENERATION SCHEME

Update on our engagement events

A huge thank you to everyone who came along to last month's engagement events at the West Looe Centre. The aim of the three events was to enable people to hear about the story so far and to give an update on progress and options considered, as well as to provide an opportunity to input into finishes and materials. It was a very busy three days for the project team, with hundreds of people taking the opportunity to ask questions and comment on the current proposals.





You can view the information presented at the events on the Let's Talk site: https://letstalk.cornwall.gov.uk/looe-flood-defence, where you can also watch a short animation of the tidal barrier . As well as providing information about the options, including the preferred option, we also wanted to seek people's views on the materials and finishes which could be used in the scheme.

We will be doing a lot more work on this element of the scheme in the coming months, including working with local artists, but below are some of the themes which were presented to people at the exhibition.







We have also been talking to local businesses to obtain information on how they have been affected by the flooding and seeking their views on the proposals. This information will be vital in helping us to demonstrate the economic benefits of the project and support our case for investment in flood defence and regeneration in Looe. If you have not been contacted by a member of the project team and would like to share your views please contact us at LooeFloodDefence@wsp.com.

The team will now be analysing all the feedback and using the results to shape the next phase of the scheme.

Looe is already one of the most frequently flooded coastal town in the UK. Over the next 100 years, sea levels are predicted to rise by more than 1 metre as a result of climate change, threatening even more parts of the town. These include the Health Centre, the Police and Fire stations, main food stores and cafes and the Fish Market, as well as major transport links such as the A387 and the railway station.

Doing nothing is not an option and we want to ensure that the final Flood Defence and Regeneration Scheme meets the needs of all parts of the local community.

RNLI lifeguard cover on the Whitsand bay beaches has now finished for this year, so it is more important than ever to Respect the Water, check the tide times, wear appropriate buoyancy aids and take a method of calling for help. If you need help or see someone in difficulties call 999 and ask for the Coastguard.

If you are on East Looe beach check the orange windsock on East Looe Town Trust's building by the Old Lifeboat Station. If it is pointing out to sea this denotes an offshore wind which can easily blow an inflatable, stand up paddleboard, kayak or canoe out to sea and hinder your attempts to return to shore safely.

Float to live

All our RNLI volunteers are asking you to make the right call. If you see someone struggling in the water, fight your instinct to jump in and help. Stay on land, call 999 and ask for the Coastguard at the coast, or Fire & Rescue when inland. Tell the person in danger to float on their back and throw them something that floats, which they can use for buoyancy. Find out more at https://respectthewater.com/.




