Tree Planting Millpool

I witnessed the planting of 5 trees on the grassy knoll and 2 in the play area today by Cormac. Attached is the specification of this phase of the Millpool planting. There are more to follow in the next planting season along the riverside, by the picnic benches and towards Kilminorth Woods. They planted 2 Oaks, a Rockhampton Red and a Liquid Amber on the knoll and a Magnolia and Japanese Crab Apple in the play area. These trees replace the trees cut along the path and will provide space for nature, enjoyment for residents and visitors and were chosen for their all-year-round colour and interest.

Cormac will monitor the trees to ensure they don't dry out and water accordingly. They have been mulched to retain moisture although this is not an issue currently but may be if we have another dry summer.

The trees are 6 years old and have been surrounded with wire protection and stakes.

The reinstatement of the footpath is now complete as the previous path was causing trip hazards.

Looe Town Council also has a Holm Oak supplied from Cornwall Council

through the Jubilee legacy tree planting scheme is in a pot and seems healthy.

The advice from Cormac tree officers is that it is not suitable for the Millpool area as it will grow quite big in time. They have looked at Kilminorth Woods, but an area would have to be cleared to accommodate its growth. In my view this is not acceptable, and the location would mean it would not be that visible and create a "landmark" The alternative location suggested is in the field at the end of Hannafore to create a "parkland" feel. This would be a highly visible tree and certainly a landmark. Cllr Michala Powell also has a number of smaller Holm Oak saplings that could also be planted. The land is owned by Cornwall.

Council but let to a Cornwall Farms tenant who would need to be consulted.

The area suggested is in the far end of the field near the picnic bench. I'm told the Holm Oak is resilient in what is an exposed location.

I am grateful to Cormac and Cornwall Council for their expertise in choosing such an interesting selection of trees and the planting.

This scheme is part of the Forest for Cornwall. I hope in time we can create a tree trail around the town which could also include the wonderful 450-year-old Chestnut in the grounds of Polvellan House.
