As the 2023 season draws to an end, our boathouse is now closed to the public and Stormy Stan is having a well-earned rest for the winter months.



LOOE TOWN COUNCIL MESSAGES FROM THE MAYOR

Looe Volunteers

In my inauguration speech in May, I expressed my desire to set up a town wide volunteer scheme for Looe. As I'm sure you know, Clir Tony Smith there are a number of volunteer groups that already do a fantastic job in the town in particular areas. However, some of these have trouble recruiting new volunteers and there are also things that need doing around the town that the current volunteer groups are not set up to do.

Our aim is to help put volunteers in touch with existing groups who need additional help and, as well, to develop a volunteer structure for those projects needed by the town, which may not be possible to achieve given the resources available but could be undertaken by teams of volunteers. To move this idea forward, 'Looe Volunteers CIC', a new Community Interest Company is being set up to help coordinate and facilitate volunteer work across the town.

We will be calling a public meeting on the 30th November for all those interested in finding out more and in helping deliver this initiative. Remembrance Sunday

It was good to see so many attending the Remembrance Sunday service at Looe War Memorial on 12th November. Special thanks must go to the Royal British Legion, St Pinnock Band, Revd. Ben Morgan-Lundie and all the volunteers that helped to bring the service together.



As Binyon wrote:

"They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them".

As a battlefield guide and military historian, I take many student and adult groups to the battlefields of France and Belgium each year and sometimes we visit the grave of or memorial to one of the groups ancestors. Often it is the first time that a member of the family has ever been to the site, and it is always an emotional moment watching them reflect on the life sacrificed. Some people have with them an old photograph showing the young man, proud in his uniform before he went overseas, or a letter from the front, things that have been treasured by the family over the generations to keep alive the memory of a loved one that never came home.

Public Toilet Charging

At our meeting on 31st October 2023, Looe Town Council decided to introduce a 20p entry fee for use of the Seafront toilets.

Residents will be aware that these are one of five sets of public toilets which we own and manage, and the cost of running all the sites amounts to over £120,000 each year.

Charging was successfully implemented at the Millpool toilets in Looe in 2021 at the rate of 20p per entry and we will be keeping the fee at this level at both the Millpool and Seafront facilities. All the income generated from toilet entry fees will be used to offset the cost of running public toilets in Looe and to fund repairs and refurbishments at the sites. Our other toilets near The Guildhall in East Looe, at West Looe Quay and at Hannafore sea front will remain free to use at present.

Disabled toilets, accessible by RADAR key, are also available at all five sets of public conveniences in the town without any charge.

Town Councillors would prefer to be able to continue to offer free use of public toilets in Looe. However, the cost of running these amounts to around a third of the Council's budget, not including the expense for any refurbishment or improvement of the buildings or facilities. Without charging entry fees, public toilets are funded from the income we receive from Council Tax and costs about £24 per resident per year (based on 2022/23 figures). Our public toilets are well used by visitors to Looe so Councillors believe it is not unreasonable to ask all those using the facilities to make a small contribution to their upkeep and servicing. We hope that everyone will soon begin to see improvements to our facilities made possible by the income generated from charging users.

Toilet entry fees in Looe are payable by card only so that no cash is stored at the sites and there is no added cost for someone to collect and bank money. If you live in Looe, you can buy a 'Residents Card' which provides up to 30 toilet entries per month for a one-off fee of £5. Once purchased, cards are automatically credited on 1st of each month. Card and contactless systems are now widely accepted as a convenient way to pay, and it is a method available to everybody.

Charging an entry fee for public toilets has been shown to reduce the amount of vandalism at premises and we would not want the storage of cash to counter this by inviting thefts or break-ins.

Residents Cards can be purchased from Looe Library or the Town Council Offices at The Millpool, Looe.

Temporary Toilet Closures

To allow our hardworking staff some time off over the festive period, our public conveniences will be **CLOSED** on 24th, 25th and 26th December 2023 and on 2nd and 3rd January 2024. Disabled facilities remain available with RADAR keys at the Guildhall, East Looe; at Millpool Car Park and at West Looe Quay.

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year

Finally, on behalf of Looe Town Council I would like to wish all Looe residents a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! Having taken the role of Mayor in May of this year, I am still learning the ropes to some extent but really appreciate the support I have had from the local community and other organisations around the town, not to mention from our more experienced Councillors.

2023 has presented us with some challenges, not least the cost-of-living crisis in the UK and, of course, recent flooding in Looe. I never cease to be impressed by the way our community rallies to meet these challenges and help others in need and I'm very proud to be the Mayor of our town.

I look forward to working with more of you in 2024 on some of the great community initiatives going on here. meantime, I wish you and your families a happy and restful festive season.



CORNISH LUGGERS

LUGGERS MEMENTOES

Prizewinners at this year's Looe Lugger Regatta were given special mementos for the first time in the 30-plus year history of the popular event.

Traditionally, Looe Town Council has always presented commemorative plaques to all visiting boat skippers, but never before have the parade winners also received unique keepsakes for their efforts.

The idea was the brainchild of Cornish Lugger Association members David Darlington and Mike Berry, both of whom have long associations with the regatta. David, who now lives at Pensilva but has strong family links with the luggers through vessels like Our Daddy and Deu Kerens, sourced some leftover Iroka wood from the engine bed of Andrew Rowe's former Falmouth Working Boat, Muriel, while Polperro-based Mike, who owns the Polperro gaffer, Maggie, used his boatbuilding and carpentry skills to up-cycle them into distinctive winners' plaques. Working at evenings and weekends, he produced one-off mementoes engraved with the Lugger Association logo and class details.

'I'm glad the skippers really liked them,' said Mike, who learned his trade with Polruan's famous Toms' 'yard and now subcontracts, working closely with his friend and fellow skipper, Andrew Rowe's APR Marine Fabrications at Sutton Harbour in Plymouth. 'They are rather unique and I don't think you could put a price on them really. It was just a little something for the skippers to take away and I'm pleased they were well received.'

Somewhat ironically two boats that would have been in the running to win one of the special awards were not sea-ready for this year's competition but both the Muriel and the Maggie are expected to back on the water way before the 2025 regatta.





LOOE FLOOD DEFENCE SCHEME UPDATE

As work continues to develop a scheme to protect Looe from frequent and severe flooding for the next 50 to 100 years, the last weekend of October provided a stark reminder of the impact of flooding on local residents and businesses today. Normally the tides experienced on 28 and 29 October would not have created a problem for the town. However raised sea levels caused by a significant low-pressure system saw water overtopping the quay walls, and overwhelming the surface water and sewerage systems.



With the drains already full of sea water, the intensive rain showers which accompanied Storm Babet had nowhere to go, resulting in water being forced out under pressure from under gully gratings and creating further flooding. Add in the impact of the bow waves from vehicles driving through the flood water and it is easy to see why local shops, pubs, restaurants and houses in the town centre were so badly affected.

The road to West

Looe was completely closed on the morning and evening tides over the weekend, as was Fore street in East Looe – effectively "closing" both sides of the town for several hours each time. This event saw additional businesses suffering as more severe flooding took place in areas that had not previously flooded to the same extent.



Some areas of the town's car parks in both East and West Looe were also under water, together with parts of the main rail line which saw some trains temporarily replaced by bus services.

Whilst most people were mainly faced with mopping up their premises or homes, some areas of the town experienced more significant damage. Large amounts of stock stored under the stage in the Guildhall and in many other shops in

Fore Street was ruined, and the Co-Op store experienced damage to its fridge and freezer units. The Jolly Sailor pub at West Looe was also badly affected.

There were also reports of gas main fractures in areas where the mains had been previously uncovered for repair work and a retaining wall backing onto a row of cottages in West Looe collapsed.

Looe was not the only place affected by flooding, however, there were also reports of flooding in Mevagissey and in Polperro along with other towns along the coast. Some people have suggested that Polperro should not have flooded as it has a flood gate and, as a result, have questioned the effectiveness of this method of flood prevention in Looe.

While it is certainly true that Polperro has a flood gate, there is only a small storage area behind the gate for the rainwater to collect. If a flood gate was added to the mouth of the Looe River, the East and West Looe Rivers would provide a much larger area than Polperro behind the gates. This would mean that closing the gates at mid tide (before an expected high tide) would create a

much larger storage area. As well as helping to avoid any flooding from behind the gates, this would also lower water levels in the river itself, thereby enabling surface water to flow out from the drains connected to gullies in the road.

The project team are continuing to work with the Save the Banjo Pier group and other stakeholders to determine if the SBP option is safe and viable. A number of meetings and workshop sessions have been held with the group to look at their proposal in more detail and we are hoping to confirm the next steps in the coming weeks. If the SBP option does meet the criteria which has been used to assess the other options, further engagement events will be held to share the findings with the local community.

The events of the last weekend of October clearly show the threat of flooding to the future of Looe. Climate change will only increase the extent, depth and frequency of flood events. To secure the

funding needed to deliver a scheme for Looe we need to show how it will help to regenerate the town as well as protect the town from flooding. We will be competing for government funding with other projects up and down the country.

To make the economic regeneration case we will need to explain how the scheme will protect key transport, including the main roads in and out of the town and rail services, and protect and enhance the visitor and marine economy. The team are working very hard to pull together the evidence needed to achieve this.

We are hoping to complete the Outline Business Case early next year so it can be submitted to the Government. A decision on funding is currently expected in 2025.

On a last note, whilst not wanting to spoil anyone's fun, playing in flooded streets is a dangerous activity. Manhole covers can get lifted and people have been killed by falling into chambers below the water surface.

Our Looe Branch Committee would like to wish all our members and friends a happy Christmas and all the best for 2024. Although we are all looking ahead to the December Christmas festivities let's spare a moment to reflect on the month of November.

Remembrance: On Saturday 11th November our branch held a short service at the Looe War Memorial to mark and honour Armistice Day, the official day to mark the end of hostilities in World War 1. There was a two-minute silence at 11am, the "eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" followed by a bugler playing the "Last Post" to mark the time that the armistice came into effect. The service was well attended even though the weather was cold and wet. The following day, Remembrance Sunday, our branch was involved in Looe Town Council's Civic Service, again at the Looe War Memorial. The St Pinnock Band was in attendance and the names and ages of the 75 men named on the memorial were read out from information provided by our branch. Although the weather was atrocious, the service was very well attended. In the afternoon several of our members attended a service of remembrance at No Man's Land.

The Poppy Appeal allows the RBL to provide a lifeline of support for thousands of serving and ex-serving personnel and their families. We are working hard to support the most vulnerable in our society, be it older veterans that we care for, those who suffer from social isolation, or those who are simply overwhelmed by the challenges associated with the cost-of-living crisis.

Poppy Appeal Collections: The Poppy Appeal just doesn't happen in November; it runs each year from October through to September. In the year ending September of this year our branch had collected £8,492, slightly down on the previous year, but we had to cancel a couple of events due to the weather. We kicked off this year's collection on Friday 27th October with a stand and Poppy Man at the Looe Guildhall which raised £460.90. A big thank you to all those that help with our collections and the public for their donations. It is time, effort and money that is never wasted.

Visit to Drake's Island. David Massey, our own answer to 'Thomas Cook', arranged yet another trip - this time a guided tour of Drake's Island in Plymouth Sound, which has defended the city and its harbour since the time of Henry VIII.

Dave's report on the trip: "We got up Thursday morning, looked out of the window and saw nothing but sunshine - a better day ahead than forecast for us. I picked up the lads and set off over the lagoon to Plymouth's Queen Anne's Battery marina, having a decent breakfast ashore before getting the ferry to take us up to St Nicholas (as it was previously known) for our tour.

On board we got talking to Pete Allen, our tour guide, who, once we had arrived on the island, gave the safety brief. Once completed we started along the pier inside the stone perimeter wall and inside to the original houses including married quarters for the forces families based there.

We were told stories of soldiers, the families and smuggling; it is unbelievable how they managed in such cramped conditions, wives doing cleaning for extra money. The tour then took us to the top of the island where a battery of large cannons was situated. Each cannon weighted some six tons which took an ingenious amount of work under a Royal

Engineer officer to move them using simple ropes, blocks and pulleys to get them from shore to the top of the island, amazing!

Then downwards to the tunnels where we were shown the systems used for lighting, passing of charges, shells from bunkers to the guns on top, all carefully planned and used to avoid any accidental discharges.

A comprehensive maze of corridors leading to various rooms that ended up being used as entertainment rooms for discos etc for outward bound courses.

Then around to the outer walk to see the outward facing arches where you could see

the different uses for defence and works. The fascinating stonework used in the construction of Drakes Island battlements is beautifully done.

The future for the island could see a hotel spa and wedding venue being developed on and also an education centre.

A return to shore and some well sought refreshment found and some good discussion on the day's activities were completed, all in all, a good successful entertaining day".

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

PELYNT MALE CHOIR

The Pelynt male choir is one of two male choirs in the Parish, and one of 24 in the Duchy. We all are members of "The Federation of Cornish Male Voice Choirs!" (Known as The Federation).

You may wonder what we do and how.

In its simplest form, we rehearse on a Tuesday evening in the Methodist Chapel in Pelynt, and then go to booked concerts.

These concerts take many forms. One of our previous concerts' was singing well-loved Sea Shanties at the naming of the new inshore lifeboat at Looe. During the dedication service, we also helped out with the hymns.

When we do concerts, we arrange a small donation to cover the choir's general costs, but we sing in places that are usually fund raising for their own charities. A few are: as mentioned, RNLI (See picture below) Cornwall Air Ambulance, Christian Aid, Help for the Ukrainian Refugees, Cancer – Race for Life and many more local Charities.



We have many different people within our choir, but we do have fun and laughter like a very large happy family. When new men join, we make them welcome into our singing group and if they do not know what "The Little Squashed Flies" on the song sheet in front of them are. Well we inform them, as the different shape flies have different meanings. These sheets in reality are called scores, which also have symbols and letters and words which indicate how to sing that particular song.

When you sing in the shower or any other place that takes your fancy. Do you always sing the high note and the low notes? The choir have different sections that you can sing in. So as part of the choir, you can laugh and enjoy the sound you make and also learn a new skill.

We are also known as "Trelawney Men" due to Sir John Trelawney 18th Baronet of the Trelawny Parish being the choir's Vice President. He also has presented the choir with our ties which he has allowed the Trelawney Coat of Arms to be the important feature on our ties. We often sing with other choirs, from Looe, The County and also with choirs that come and visit The Duchy. This year we sang with Brecon Male Voice Choir (Cor Meibion Aberhonddu) when they came to visit.



Our last concert was at St Just with Marizion Apollo, St Buryan and Nankersy Male Choirs. There are also organisations within the county that bring choir singers together and arrange visits to other parts of the world, with visits to Canada and Australia. There you meet the locals and quite often they have a Cornish background. Pelynt Male Choir also goes on tours, to all parts of the United Kingdom.

The choirs' last visit was to Sussex, but there have been memorable visits to the Isle of White and the County of Derbyshire, just to name a couple of visits where friends were met and made.

The choir's members were also part pf The Federations' Choirs Concert in September of last year in Birmingham's Symphony Hall, where we all sang to raise money for the County's Air Ambulance.

Our choir's annual programme is quite busy, with learning new songs usually introduced in the spring and then from Easter onwards approximately two concerts per month, with a three week break in summer and then we get to the Christmas period when the Christmas Carols are sung.

In the Christmas period, our concerts are slightly different as our lady partners are invited to form their own choir and sing with us at our carol concerts. Not only do we sing carols, we also sing Cornish songs, Folk songs, both British and Foreign, usually in English, Songs from the shows, ABBA songs and other popular songs which have been converted from a solo version to a choral version, Spirituals and many more.

We have a vast repertoire. Many times, we have been asked to sing with the Children in Pelynt Primary School. Both the children and our members enjoyed the singing. We also sang at the Trelawny Fair which was held in their playing field on behalf of Pelynt residents.

If you would like to use your singing skills or even learn how to master this skill come along and listen one night. You will be made welcome. We rehearse on Tuesday evenings, starting at 7.00pm until 9.00pm in Pelynt Methodist Chapel. We also once a month usually go the "The Jubilee Inn" at Pelynt to sing Cornish Folk Songs. Even if you are a frequent visitor to our beach, please be aware of the weather conditions and other safety matters. Please take a minute to read the information on the signs by the entrance to the beach and check wind strength and direction by a quick glance at the orange windsock that flies on the seafront.

The Old Guildhall Museum & Gaol has now closed for the winter. Many thanks to our wonderful band of knowledgeable and enthusiastic volunteers who run the museum. Although the museum is now closed until April 2024, the work continues in the background.
