

Summer 2024 Update

Welcome to the Summer edition of the Cornwall Emotional Support Service update. We hope that you can take a moment in the sunshine, to catch up on all of our news!

What difference has the Cornwall Emotional Support Service made?

Since our service began in 2022, **over 500 stroke survivors** and their family members or carers have been referred to our counselling service. This is incredible but also a reflection of the high need for emotional support that exists across Cornwall.

Between April and July this year, **80% of the referrals** that we received were from our health partners with **Rehabilitation Technicians** being the top referring role. The remaining **20% of referrals** were made by voluntary sector partners or as self referrals from individual stroke survivors.

Feedback about our counselling service – This is a selection of the comments received between April and June 2024 from stroke survivors.

'It's been good, I understand where my frustration comes from and have some strategies now. Things have been better with my family.'

'I've got things I can focus on until our next session. It makes me feel like I can get a little bit of control back and move forward'

"I'm going to miss our conversations; you've helped me think about things in a different way."

"I do look forward to our chats, I feel like I'm waffling away sometimes but it does help, I think it's just getting it all out that's good"

In May, to mark Stroke Awareness Month, the Stroke Association launched its first ever garden at the **RHS Chelsea Flower Show**. Miria Harris, designer of the Garden

for Recovery, had a stroke in 2019. Gardening and being in nature were things that helped Miria reconnect with her old self after her stroke.

We are pleased to announce that the garden won a **bronze medal**. The garden embodies the belief there are paths to recovery for stroke survivors.
